



# SETSCoP Meeting Summary Communique LGBTIQA+ Subgroup – 27 November 2024

Facilitated by The Social Policy Group (SPG)

#### 1. LGBTIQA+ Subgroup

 The LGBTIQA+ Subgroup discussed the unique challenges faced by LGBTIQA+ migrants and refugees, the importance of culturally responsive service delivery, and opportunities to enhance sector-wide capacity for safe and inclusive services, while amplifying existing initiatives.

### 2. Service Provider Experiences and Challenges

- Organisations like STARTTS, Many Coloured Sky, and MercyCare are leading efforts to build sector capacity in LGBTIQA+ service delivery.
- Some providers are apprehensive about openly supporting LGBTIQA+ individuals ("flying the rainbow"), fearing disconnection from certain communities. STARTTS' experience indicates these fears may be unfounded.
- For service providers in remote or regional areas, there is inadequate access to and available specialist services for LGBTIQA+
- For regional providers—also among small communities—LGBTIQA+ clients may be reluctant to access queer-centred services due to safety concerns.

## 3. Many Coloured Sky (MCS) - Ian Seal and MCS team

- Many Coloured Sky—as well as STARTTS—provide secondary consultations to guide organisations in culturally safe, inclusive, and effective responses.
- As a new SETS provider—brings an informed queer lens to settlement and migration.
- Funding to deliver specialised (with expertise) services is limited.
- Programs and approaches to service delivery are informed by lived experience and is centred on clients' needs, with a strong emphasis on intersectionality.
- Programs have offered clients a connection to community, safety, and sense of belonging, recognising that for queer migrants and refugees, cultural communities may not be safe.

## 4. Rainbow Migrants Living Lab (Presentation by Dr Lukasz Krzyzowski, Edith Cowan University)

- Ideas of queer identity are often Western-centric and may not align with culturally diverse perspectives.
- Intimate Partner Violence (IPV):
  - > Queer migrants and refugees may face coercive control from partners. These can include threats of blackmail or of exposure to communities of origin or religious groups, often deepening social isolation.
  - > Cultural misunderstandings may exacerbate these power imbalances and abuse.
- Western concepts of queer visibility can conflict with the safety needs of migrants and refugees, creating pressure to conform to expectations that may not align with their lived realities.

- > How can the subgroup, the SETSCoP, and the secretariat support and amplify existing work to ensure a coordinated sector response that is safe and inclusive for LGBTIQA+ migrants and refugees?
- > Can a heat map of sector capacity be helpful?

## Trauma-Informed Care for LGBTIQA+ Clients

What does trauma-informed care mean at the intersectional experiences of LGBTIQA+ migrants and refugees?

## Safety in Settlement

- What is the current state of safety for LGBTIQA+ migrants and refugees in the settlement sector?
- > How do SETS providers perceive their organisational capacity to address these concerns, and where are the gaps?

#### **Outcomes**

 The subgroup will co-design an outcome that will support subgroup members in their work and wider SETS program and community of practice.

#### 6. For consideration:

- Build on existing initiatives to strengthen cross-sector referral pathways (SETS and outside of SETS services) for LGBTIQA+ clients.
- Continue fostering national collaboration to ensure consistent, culturally safe, and traumainformed service delivery.
- Amplify lived experience voices to shape innovative and responsive practices in the settlement sector.
